## Cost of Various Colorado Health Care Reform Proposals

In 2007, the Colorado Blue Ribbon Commission for Health Care Reform hired the Lewin Group, a national health economics analysis firm, to evaluate the costs and effectiveness of four proposals moving towards universal health care<sup>1</sup>. The results were clear:

Proposal	# Remaining Uninsured <sup>2</sup>	Increase in Total Health Care Spending <sup>3</sup>
Better Health Care for Colorado	467,000	\$595 million
Solutions for a Healthy Colorado	138,000	\$271 million
A Plan for Covering Coloradans	109,000	\$1.3 billion
The Colorado Health Services (Single Payer) Program	0	-\$1.4 billion

<u>Better Health Care for Colorado</u>- would increase access to public programs and to private insurance coverage with low-income subsidies.

<u>Solutions for a Healthy Colorado</u> - would provide a limited benefit set in the private sector with low-income subsidies, and expands coverage under Medicaid and Child Health Plus.

<u>A Plan for Covering Coloradans</u>- would require private pool participation with low-income subsidies and expanded public programs.

<u>The Colorado Health Services (Single Payer) Program</u> - would provide coverage with comprehensive benefits to all residents of the state. Consumers would have their choice of providers and hospitals within the state.
